OPENING REMARKS


Looking back at the 2024/25 season, we may have had fewer winners than in previous years, but we're proud to report a notable increase in prize money!

We concluded the season ranked 9th in the Trainers' Championship — an improvement on last year's 11th — thanks in no small part to another Grade 1 triumph. Crambo delivered a standout performance, securing victory in the Long Walk Hurdle at Ascot for the second consecutive year, one of several memorable moments.

Tripoli Flyer impressed with a commanding win in the Dovecote Hurdle at Kempton, followed by a superb third-place finish in a Grade 1 at Punchestown. That'll Do Moss also showcased her talent on Irish soil, placing third in the Jane Seymour Listed Hurdle at Sandown before going on to finish a gallant second in a Grade 1 at Fairyhouse, just two lengths off the winner. A four-timer across the cards late in the season provided a truly unforgettable day. John Barbour and Siog Geal delivered at Newbury, while further north in Scotland, Leloopa and Is This For Real completed the remarkable 1,072-1 quartet.

None of this would have been possible without the unwavering hard work, skill, and dedication of the entire team at Ravenswell — their commitment continues to drive our success year after year.







END OF SEASON

Last season concluded in spectacular fashion, with the fiercely contested trainer's championship going right down to the wire.

In the end, it was Willie Mullins who proved too strong. His 38 British winners, which included 13 Grade 1's and two Nationals, securing the title for the second year running.

The master of Closutton amassed just over £3.5 million in prize money this side of the Irish Sea, averaging a remarkable £100,000 per winner. His closest rival, Dan Skelton, put up a valiant effort in defeat, training 179 winners across the campaign, with the battle remaining very much alive until the final afternoon.

The Skeltons will no doubt be back next season with a renewed effort, sharing success this campaign in the inaugural running of the David Power Jockeys Cup.

Sean Bowen emerged as champion jockey, going one better than last year to claim the title with 180 winners. His standout victories including the Bet365 Gold Cup, the Irish Grand National and an unforgettable ride aboard Booster Bob in the Greatwood Gold Cup.

One of the most remarkable races of the season was the Champion Hurdle, with Constitution Hill falling out in the country and State Man coming down at the last with the race at his mercy. It left the Jeremy Scott superstar, Golden Ace, weaving her way through traffic to land another Grade 1 success for the team.

Just three days later, a 100/1 winner of the Triumph Hurdle and a monstrous Gold Cup display from Iknowthewayurthinkin capped the week off with the Irish running rampant, as they often do, at Prestbury Park.

That dominance continued into Aintree, where five of the first seven Grand National finishers hailed from the Mullins stable. His team claiming eight winners across the meeting, setting the stage for a thrilling conclusion to the Trainers' title.

It all came down to the final day at Sandown, where Mullins struck not once, not twice, but three times, sealing a second British trainers' title, sending the silverware back across the Irish Sea. Mullins now with the potential to surpass the record set by Vincent O'Brien, with three successive British trainers' championship wins.

Closer to home, 85 winners and $\pm 1,210,390$ in prize money included Grade 1 number three for team FOB, with two-time Long Walk hurdle winner Crambo staying on tenaciously to continue his excellent record in Berkshire.

Multiple Graded wins and valuable handicaps were also part of the FOB success this season, recently displayed with a fantastic across the card four-timer at Kelso and Newbury, wrapping up the season in good style. The Cheltenham April meeting proved fruitful for the team too, with Manofthepeople making it back-to-back wins in the race and Greyval forging clear to land the Mares Challenger Final.

New stable jockey Johnny Burke had his best ever season numerically and congratulations to Jack Hogan who recently rode out his claim.

Manothepeople people had a job to do that afternoon and a full year on, he looked almost as reliable as the man who used to ride him.

Of course what the public didn't know at the time was who would become our new stable jockey. Well just as Paddy headed in to weigh in for the last time, I captured an important moment. A strong handshake of good luck to his successor, Jonathan Burke. It was a 'changing of the guard' moment and just like that, the baton was passed on.

Jonathan has fit straight into his role here with ultimate professionalism and his first season at Ravenswell has been his best season ever as a jockey. One thing had eluded him, he hadn't ridden Fergal a Cheltenham winner.

Manothepeople has had another consistent season, running well to finish 5th at the Cheltenham Festival in the Kim Muir.

In the early stages of the race, he looked like he was struggling to go the pace. Johnny having to nudge and tease him along after a circuit. By the time they had climbed the top of the hill on the back straight for the final time, there was a sense of inevitability about it. Some big leaps took Johnny to a share of the lead over the second last and a huge jump at the last sealed it.

A big moment for Johnny to ride his first (of many hopefully) Cheltenham winners for the yard. Manothepeople, as reliable and genuine as they come. The same could say the same about the man who retired on his back twelve months before.

You know what they say about buses... the next day Greyval because Johnnys second Cheltenham winner for the team.



HOW MICRO SHARE SYNDICATES ARE CHANGING HORSE RACING IN THE UK...

In recent years, micro share syndicates have emerged as a transformative force in the world of British horse racing. Once considered an elite sport reserved for aristocrats and wealthy enthusiasts, racehorse ownership is now more accessible than ever, thanks to the rise of fractional ownership models. Micro share syndicates, offering small shares in racehorses at affordable prices, are democratising the sport and reshaping the industry in profound ways.

IS IT REAL RACEHORSE OWNERSHIP OR IS IT A GIMMICK?

Traditional racehorse ownership often requires significant financial investment from purchase and training fees to veterinary care and travel costs. For decades, this high barrier to entry excluded the average fan from ever dreaming of owning a thoroughbred.

Micro share syndicates are none of the above.



Although it's not the same as owning a larger share in a racehorse it's been a great way to follow a horses journey for a fraction of the cost.

We have had microshare businesses such as Old Gold Racing (John Barbour) and The

Owners Group (Carlo Du Berlais). They allow members of the public to purchase micro shares in racehorses for as little as £40.

These micro shares don't entitle individuals to have the full benefits of owning a racehorse, the return is more experiential than transactional, but they do grant a genuine sense of involvement.

Owners receive updates, enter ballots to attend race days, visit training yards, and celebrate wins alongside other shareholders. In essence,



syndicates offer a taste of ownership without the long-term risks or costs.

A BOOST FOR THE INDUSTRY

The ripple effects of this model are being felt across the industry. Attendance at race meetings has been bolstered by the enthusiastic presence of syndicate members. According to data from the Racehorse Syndicates Association, the number of syndicated owners has increased by over



40% in the past five years, and many of these are newcomers to the sport.

In a time when introducing new people to the sport, as well as educating them on the amazing journey racehorses go on, even just to make it to the track, micro syndicates at the very least do exactly that.

CREATING A COMMUNITY

One of the most compelling aspects of micro share syndicates is their social nature. Online forums, apps and social media pages allow co-owners to share insights, experiences, and celebrations. Race days become communal events, with dozens of shareholders travelling across the country to cheer on "their" horse. This sense of community and camaraderie is particularly appealing to younger fans, many of whom are encountering the sport in a meaningful way for the first time.

Some syndicates have gone further by offering behind-the-scenes content, stable visits, and regular video updates from trainers and jockeys. This transparency builds trust and deepens engagement, fostering long-term loyalty to both the sport and specific syndicate brands.

Micro share syndicates are revolutionising British horse racing, making it more inclusive, dynamic, and financially sustainable. Of course, you can't even start to compare it to owning a horse outright, but it does offer a new and exciting experience to a new audience. By opening the gates to a broader

> audience, they are breathing new life into the sport, not only preserving its heritage but securing its future. In a world where many traditional sports are struggling to stay relevant, horse racing may have found its winning formula?


